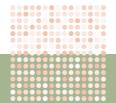


How to write good prompts



A prompt is the question or instruction you give to an Al tool.

Good prompts lead to clearer, more accurate, and more useful results — while poor prompts often create vague, incorrect, or unhelpful answers.

Learning to write strong prompts is essential for using AI as an effective study partner, not a shortcut.



What is a "good" prompt?


A good prompt is:

- Clear the AI knows exactly what you want
- Specific includes necessary details
- Contextualised explains your task or background
- Purposeful tells the AI what to produce
- Ethical supports your learning, not replaces it



Why writing good prompts matters?

- · Saves time
- Produces more accurate answers
- Reduces misunderstandings or errors
- Helps you evaluate Al more effectively
- Supports ethical use and genuine learning
- · Gives you greater control over the output





Step-by-step: how to write a good prompt

1 Be clear about your purpose

Tell the Al exactly what you need:

- "Help me understand..."
- "Explain..."
- "Give me steps for..."
- "Generate ideas for..."

Generic prompts \rightarrow generic answers.





2 Give enough context

Include important details:

- · Your course or subject
- Your level (undergraduate, master, beginner, advanced)
- · The type of assignment or task
- What you already know or struggle with

Example:

Instead of:

"Explain SWOT."

Try:

"Explain SWOT in simple terms for a first-year hospitality student, with one real example."





3 Specify the format

Al responds better when you tell it how to structure the answer:

- · Bullet points
- Paragraph
- Table
- Steps
- Comparison
- Short / long / simple / academic

Example:

"Summarise the article in 5 bullet points suitable for an annotated bibliography."



4 Set boundaries or requirements

Tell the AI what to include and what to avoid:

- · Word count
- Tone (academic, friendly, professional)
- Definitions
- Examples
- · No citations unless verified
- · No writing full assignments

Example:

"Explain this concept briefly (150 words), without giving citations, and include one practical example."



5 Ask follow-up questions

A prompt is the beginning, not the end.

- Use follow-up prompts to:
- Clarify
- Correct mistakes
- Add details
- · Narrow the focus
- · Deepen understanding

Example:

"That's helpful. Now give me an example related to front-office operations."





Example: Weak vs. Strong Prompts

Weak Prompt:


"Write about leadership."

→ Result: Vague, general, not tailored to your needs.

Strong Prompt

"Explain the difference between transactional and transformational leadership in 150 words, using simple language for a first-year hospitality student. Include one example from hotel management."

→ Result: Clear, accurate, relevant, and structured.





Useful Prompt Frames

Understanding Concepts

"Explain topic in simple terms for a beginner."

"Give me a step-by-step explanation of topic with one example."

Brainstorming

"Generate 5 ideas for topic, suitable for an undergraduate assignment."

Studying

"Create a study plan for topic with daily tasks for one week."

"Help me understand the difference between concept A and concept B in a table."

Writing Support

"Rewrite this paragraph to make it clearer and more concise, without adding new information."

Research Prep

"Suggest 10 keywords I can use to search databases about topic."

Reflection

"Help me generate reflection questions based on this experience: [...]."



Tips & Tricks

Start with simple instructions, then refine

Don't ask AI to complete assessments for you

Break complex tasks into smaller prompts

<u>Check accuracy</u> using reliable sources

Be honest about what you need ("I don't understand...")

Treat prompting like a conversation — adjust as you go

Use your own voice and rewrite Al output ethically






Good prompt checklist
